C-D-UI for Thesis Statements

Claim, Direction(s), and the Universal Idea

- 1. Begin with a broad subject: A Christmas Carol
- 2. Narrow to a specific topic: The character, Bob Cratchit
- 3. Ask a question about the topic: Why is Bob Cratchit important to the story?
- 4. Apply C-D-UI to get your thesis statement.

THESIS: "Bob Cratchit symbolically represents the ideal father."

So, this thesis implies that through symbolic interpretations Bob Cratchit will be proven to represent an ideal father. The **Direction** will be the symbols, the **Claim** is that Bob Cratchit represents something (note—the claim is tied to the verb), and the **Universal Idea** is about an "ideal father."

YOUR ASSIGNMENT: The following are some examples of thesis statements. Please mark the <u>Claim</u> (C), <u>Direction</u> (D) and <u>Universal</u> <u>Idea</u> (UI) of each thesis. If you cannot find all three, the thesis is BAD. If you can find all three, it is GOOD.

- 1. Scrooge's encounters with ghosts illustrate the transformative power of memory.
- 2. Scrooge is forced to remember events of the past.
- 3. The archetype of clothing reflects Huck's desire for individuality.
- 4. In *Huckleberry Finn*, Huck and Jim experience several conflicts during their travel down the river.
- 5. In *Great Expectations* the hands motif indicates Pip's location in the journey toward maturity.
- 6. The sea metaphor allows Matthew Arnold to develop a political commentary on the Victorian Age, a time in which man is isolated and void of religious conviction, a situation that can only be rectified by human love.
- 7. There are many symbols in the book *Huckleberry Finn*.
- 8. The diction and imagery Mark Twain uses in relaying Huck's story reveals his personal struggle with freedom and civilization.
- 9. Dickens repeats the images of "hands" throughout the novel.
- 10. Matthew Arnold's sea metaphor plays a significant role in the poem.
